The World Health Organization recommends values clarification interventions as a critical part of training for abortion providers to address abortion stigma as barrier to accessing abortion care. Values clarification refers to the process of reflecting on one's moral reasoning to identify the values that one feels are most meaningful and important. This process can help one identify when these values conflict with assumptions or actions that may be informed by social norms or other external influences and examine alternate values and their consequences.

This survey takes about 10 minutes to complete. You can stop at any time and you are not required to complete it. You can do it in one sitting or in parts. In order to protect your confidentiality, your responses to this survey will be coded but the codes and your private information will be kept in separate locations.

This survey is voluntary, and you may skip any question you do not wish to answer. There are no direct benefits to you for taking part in this study. Your medical student or residency standing will not be affected if you do not participate or by your responses if you respond to the survey.
